One of the most versatile musicians in our band is Chuck Herrbach, and I am delighted to highlight his musical career for your enjoyment. Chuck's life got off to a rocky start; he was born on the road somewhere between Yosemite and Madera, California. His mother and grandmother started the trek sometime after midnight with an old rebuilt car that broke down as they traveled to the hospital. They were able to flag down a kind gentleman who offered to take the now

three-member crew to the hospital in Madera. The car experienced two flat tires on the way, but somehow, they made it and everyone received the medical attention they so desperately needed. After that entrance into the world, Chuck was prepared for just about anything.

Chuck became interested in playing music after he attended a music appreciation class in the seventh grade in SoCal. He started out in beginning winds, hoping to learn the saxophone. His teacher, Mr. Zarlinga, just happened to have an extra clarinet in the band room, so Chuck began to learn clarinet on the school's instrument. But, not giving up on the sax, he borrowed a sax music book and began teaching himself on an old C-melody saxophone he had at home. Not long after that, still in seventh grade, he talked Mr. Zarlinga into letting him play the baritone sax that happened to reappear in the band room after a mysterious absence. Chuck then joined the dance band that rehearsed during lunch break, and in a few weeks, he was ready to perform for the lunch dances. About this same time, he was asked to join





the Los Caballero Youth Band. Chuck remembers that the next five years were filled with a lot of marching, both in parades and halftime shows. Maintaining his membership in all music classes offered from both of the high schools he attended, Chuck performed on all three instruments — the

clarinet and the alto and baritone sax — with both the concert band and orchestra. He transferred from Banning High School to the newly opened Carson High School and graduated from there while never missing an opportunity to perform.

With graduation from high school nearing, Chuck looked into joining the military and decided on the U.S. Navy to take advantage of their "kiddie cruise" program. If you joined before your 18th birthday, you would be able to finish your service before your 21st birthday. He auditioned in San Diego, passed and joined the U.S. Navy as a musician. Chuck served on three aircraft carriers

after basic training and attended the Navy School of Music. He spent 13 months at sea, mostly off the coast of Vietnam. After three years, three months and three days, Chuck was honorably discharged.

Out of the military, Chuck resumed his studies. He graduated from CSU Dominguez Hills, earning a B.A. in music and behavioral sciences. Chuck became a professional musician, joining both the Local 47 and 7 unions. He gave private music lessons for Marshall Music Stores for about seven years while delivering aircraft freight containers as a heavyweight truck driver in the summers. Chuck then delivered U.S. mail from hubs to post offices all over SoCal, still performing and playing gigs during the evening and weekends. Now Chuck performs in big bands, orchestras, show bands and community bands. He donates his time and expertise to the LASD Band when time allows.
